Transparency and data analytics will help policymakers and constituents make informed decisions about government consolidation. This will lead to data-driven and well-thought-out consolidation, preserving essential services and necessary units of government.

Legislation should be passed to create and adequately fund the Division of Analytics and Consolidation in the Office of the Comptroller. Through this legislation, the Comptroller's office will conduct research and analyze data to identify units of local government and services that should be consolidated. Factors such as comparable tax rates, geography, service mapping, and cost savings will be considered through this neutral analysis. Recommendations on consolidation will be made and posted on the Comptroller's website as a catalyst for consolidation.

It is time to take decisive action on property taxes. Data-driven government consolidation can have a meaningful and lasting impact on taxpayers across Illinois.
